LTS Completes Fall Semester

We thank the Lord for His many blessings on LTS this last part of the fall semester. The regular classes concluded on 24 May and final exams concluded on 7 June. Besides the normal preparation for end of term, LTS students had many other activities to keep them occupied right up to the end.

Dr. John Nordling of Concordia Theological Seminary in Ft. Wayne., Indiana and Dr. E.A. Wilhelm Weber, Sr. gave special lectures. These lecturers taught intensive courses on Philippians and Psalms.

LTS students and staff were able to join in the celebrations held at the University of Pretoria (UP) of a new translation of the Book of Concord on Friday, 26 April.

Two days later UP was the venue for another celebration, a Mission Festival hosted by the Mission of Lutheran Church, a mission society supported by the Selbständige Evangelisch-Lutherische Kirche (SELK) in Germany.



Deaconess Courses: Growing in Ministry Skills



The deaconess class took a field trip in May to the Lutheran Hour Ministries South Africa Office in Johannesburg. Rev. Siza Lugojolo took the ladies to see the prison ministry of Lutheran Hour Ministries.

This semester has included a lot of learning in 'hand knowledge' – combining head knowledge and heart knowledge (faith) in the practical service that is deaconess ministry.

Teaching in the Sunday school setting was one area of particular focus in the Deaconess Skills course. Aided by Mrs. Karin Niebuhr, a lifelong South African Lutheran and trained teacher, the students learned how children of different ages learn, how to plan a lesson, and how teaching in Sunday school differs from teaching other subjects. Using Concordia Publishing House Sunday School materials provided by Concordia Gospel Outreach, the deaconess students took turns teaching

Sunday School with about 10 -16 elementary school children each week.

For some, this was a firsttime experience. When the deaconess students first learned that they would be teaching, they said, "Deaconess, how will we teach them? They can teach us!" Nevertheless, they each approached their task with careful preparation and a measure of bravery. Each week the assigned teacher was aided by an assigned helper, and I was also able to be in the classroom with them as a 'safety net.' And, yes, it does get easier with practice!

In the Contemporary Issues in Ministry to Women and Children course, each student completed a major project in an area of interest: orphans, child abuse, abortion, HIV/AIDS, widows. We learned how to study the demographic information that informs us of the scope of need, what resources may already be available in the social sector, and how the church might respond in meaningful ways with mercy – practical help combined with the gospel message.

The class also studied grief using Granger Westberg's *Good Grief*, and discussed the work of the deaconess in bringing God's comfort to those who are grieving. We considered miscarriage, cancer and aged care. The work of the deaconess is important in these and other areas, because women in most African cultures do not easily share such intimate concerns with men, including the pastor.

A highlight of the term was a field trip to prison. Lutheran Hour Ministries (LHM) has a weekly prison outreach, and we were able to join Rev. Siza Lugojolo on one of his regular Wednesday visits. Again, this was a 'first' for our students, and helped them to see the spiritual needs of this often-forgotten segment of society. We also visited the LHM office, learned about other outreach efforts of LHM, and received a number of booklets on various topics that will be good resources in future ministry.

SeTswana Book of Concord Presentation

Why do Lutherans take so seriously their confessional statements of faith in the Book of Concord? Are such confessional statements particular only to Lutherans? The editors of *The Book of Concord* from Fortress Press (2000) explain it like this:

"From the second century on Christians have expressed the biblical faith in summaries that served to identify the church's public message. The Greek word symbol-a technical word for creed-identified the function of such summaries of the church's teaching as its identifying statement of belief, purpose, and mission. The Apostles' and Nicene Creeds both offered believers guidance for public instruction and witness and also served to regulate and evaluate the public theology of the church's teachers. They demarcated lines between errors that had attacked the faith and biblical truth." (From page 1.)

Since students of LTS study



to be public ministers and servants in the Lutheran church, every new translation of the Book of Concord is a significant event. SeTswana is the mother tongue of some LTS students, so this translation is personally significant!

Thus it was a wonderful day when translators, editors, donors, churchmen and academics of South Africa and LTS students and staff could gather together to publicly speak and reflect upon the significance of the new translation.

The presentation was hosted at the University of Pretoria. Guests included translators and editors, Dr. E. A. Wilhelm Weber, Sr. and Rev. David Tswaedi, D.D.; Dr. Ishmael Noko (Emeritus LWF General Secretary); Dr. Johan Buitendag (Dean of



The brass bands of several congregations combined to offer music before, during and after the service.


Rev. Christoph Weber, a missionary of MLC, was the preacher for the service. LCSA and FELSiSA pastors led liturgy and readings for the worship.

LTS students are grateful for the opportunity to receive lectures from Lutheran instructors from around the world.


