This year, the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Tshwane has six new first-year students, pictured left. 18 students are in their second year of studies, bringing the total student body to 24 students.

Of the 24 students, 16 are South African, 4 from Ethiopia, 3 from the DRC (Congo), and one from Malawi.

The new academic year started on February 8th.

#### Rector's message:



During my recent trip to the USA, I attended an ordination service one Sunday afternoon. During Holy Communion, the newly ordained pastor blessed the children at the communion rail, saying, "The Lord bless you and keep you in the grace of your baptism".

During our Ash Wednesday chapel service on campus, I was reminded of these words. In Lent, we very much focus on the cross of Jesus, His suffering and death. The season of Lent is kept as a time of special devotion, of self-denial, and humble repentance born of a faithful heart. And as part of the Ash Wednesday liturgy, we acknowledge that we are dust and to dust we shall re-

turn. Ash Wednesday and the whole Lenten season show us our sin and its consequences. As we read in Romans 6:23: "The wages of sin is death".

But Romans 6:23 continues, "the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord". This gift of eternal life was given to us by God in baptism, where we were marked with a cross. The sign of the cross was made upon our forehead and heart.


While Ash Wednesday teaches us that sin and death leaves its mark on everything, our baptism is the promise that we have been connected to the death and resurrection of Jesus. He died for our sins also. He has come to bring the gift of eternal life to us also.

Throughout these forty days of Lent, we will see how the Lord saved us, taking away the sins of the world by dying on that cross that rightfully belongs to us. He died the death we deserve. It is there on the cross that He accomplished His mightiest work. All for our salvation.

So, this Lent, these days after Ash Wednesday, do not forget the cross which you wear upon your forehead and heart. The sign of the cross you put on when you were conquered and claimed in baptism. Remember that Jesus died for your sins also. Therefore, repent, and receive His forgiveness.

Do not forget that you were marked with the sign of the cross at your baptism. This cross is our hope in life and in death. As we sing in the last verse of the hymn "Abide with me" (LSB 878:6):

Hold Thou Thy Cross before my closing eyes; Shine through the gloom, and point me to the skies; Heaven's morning breaks, and earth's vain shadows flee; In life. in death, O Lord, abide with me. Amen.

### LTS RECTOR VISITS USA

From February 14-25, Rector Hiestermann visited the USA for the first time. Here's a short report:

In 2020, LTS applied for accreditation with the South African Department of Higher Education to offer a three-year diploma in theology.

The accreditation process brings some challenges with it: In the past, LTS has had two groups of students: Junior and Senior Students. With the new three-year diploma, a third group of students needs to be accommodated. God willing, from 2023, LTS will have first-, second-, and third-year students.

To be able to teach and host three cohorts of students, LTS will need:

- And additional classroom. We currently have two classrooms, a third one will be needed.
- At least one more fulltime lecturer.
- More office space for the academic staff.
- More student accommodation.
- Possibly additional staff accommodation.

To discuss possible ways of overcoming these challenges, I visited the USA. My trip consisted of three legs: Phoenix, Fort Wayne, and St. Louis.

In Phoenix, I visited a meeting of COFA (<u>Christian Outreach for Africa</u>). COFA, with its members from the LCMS Michigan District, has been supporting the work of the Confessional Lutheran Church of South Africa for many years. COFA members had visited LTS in November 2021, as reported in the previous newsletter. At the COFA meeting in Phoenix, I explained the abovementioned needs to COFA members, and COFA South Africa member David Hannay introduced possible ideas for the redevelopment of the LTS campus.

After the meeting, I attended the "Best Practices Ministry" Conference (BPM) for two days, where Pastor Micah Greiner and Michigan District President David Maier made lots of effort to introduce me to many people. I attended some of the sessions at the conference which were very informative. Below is a picture of a session held at BPM.



After my visit to Phoenix, I travelled to Fort Wayne, where Prof. John Pless took great care of me. He gave me a tour of the campus of the Concordia Theological Seminary Fort Wayne (CTSFW) and introduced me to some faculty members. I also met for the first time, in person, former LTS student Gemah Ballah from Liberia.

Prof. Dr. Detlev Schulz, who is the Ph.D. supervisor of LTS lecturer Rev. John Nkambule invited me and Prof. Pless for dinner one night.

It was good to finally meet some members of SPLMS in person. I was humbled to see how much effort the SPLMS makes in supporting LTS, simply for the Gospels' sake. I am grateful for these faithful supporters of the seminary. May God bless the wonderful work they are doing. I also met with Prof. Roethemeyer, Rev. Richard Lammert and Rev. Roger Peters, all from the CTSFW Kroemer Library to discuss the Chemnitz Library Initiative.

Dr. Rutt gave me a tour of the campus, including climbing up the Luther tower. He and his wife Deborah also invited me for dinner one evening.
