After 17 students had graduated in 2023, the largest group in many years, we were slightly concerned about student numbers for 2024. But thanks be God, for again calling men to study theology at LTS. In total, 12 new students have enrolled.

This year, we have students from South Africa (17), Ethiopia (3), Malawi (2), the DRC Congo (1), and Nigeria (1).

Return on investment?

I recently had a conversation with a businessperson about returns on investment (ROI). In the business world, return on investment is a frequently used concept. Before a company decides if they want to invest in a project, they ask themselves what the ROI will be. In other words, they consider if the investment will be profitable enough to make it worthwhile.

In the business world, return on investment is used to evaluate how well an investment has performed. But how is return of investment is measured at a seminary? If someone is considering donating to the seminary, how is return on investment measured? How can they know if their investment in a seminary or church has performed adequately or not?

Using the measurements of the business world, we will have difficulty calculating the return on investment in a church setup. Yes, we may say that a donation helps to support the theological education of a specific number of students and staff. We can roughly calculate how many members current students might be serving in five years' time. But these considerations don't really answer whether the ROI is good or not.

When deliberating such matters as whether a donation to a seminary of church has a good or a bad ROI, we should first consider God's "investment" in us. As always in church, we start with God. He created heaven and earth and all things in it. He invested bounteously in humankind. He created Adam and Eve who lived in paradise. But it did not take too long before they disobeyed God and sinned. Would God have been satisfied with His ROI in humankind, since "All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned-every one-to his own way" (Is 53:6)?

The time of Lent serves as a good reminder of how God calculates ROI. He sent his Son Jesus Christ into the world to save us from our sin. "Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men" (Phil 2:6-7)

God "invested" the life of his own Son for our salvation. Jesus suffered and died on the cross because of our sins. "He was pierced for our transgressions; he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with his wounds we are healed" (Is 53:5).

This is how ROI works in God's kingdom: "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Cor 5:21). God "invests" everything, we receive everything. God's "investment" in us is always greater than we realize. Always far greater than we deserve. Always immeasurably greater than what we can repay.

A confessional Lutheran seminary or church where this message of Jesus is proclaimed, will always be worth investing in. (Heinz Hiestermann)

Lutheran Theological Education in Southern Africa

From October 30th – November 3rd, a symposium of LUCSA (Lutheran Communion of South Africa) took place in Boksburg, South Africa. The topic was "Pastoral Formation: Geared at mission/church growth".

LUCSA has 15 member churches with about 2 million members in total from 10 Southern African countries.

Theological educators from the LUCSA member churches were invited to the conference. Although the LTS is not affiliated to LUCSA, myself and registrar Rev. Hanfato attended the conference to learn more about the landscape of Lutheran theological education in Southern Africa.

The following key points were taken from the conference:

- There are only two Lutheran Seminaries in Southern Africa. One is Paulinum in Windhoek, Namibia, which is affiliated to the LWF.
- LTS is the only Confessional Lutheran (ILC) Seminary in Southern Africa.
- The ELCSA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in South Africa), is attempting to restart their own seminary in Umphumulo outside of Durban.



In the countries where Lutheran Churches do not have own seminaries, students study at public universities or "ecumenical" seminaries. At an ecumenical seminary, there will typically be one Lutheran instructor, and students are by instructors taught from various denominations, including Pentacostal churches.

Many of the attendees did not know about the existence of LTS.

May God give that the LTS, as only confessional Lutheran Seminary in Southern Africa, may continue to play an important role in theological education in the area.
